

### **BACK TO ECUADOR**

After six weeks in the U.S. we returned to Ecuador for five weeks. Some folks wonder why we didn't just stay in the U.S. through the beginning of October when our originally-planned trip to Wisconsin would end, but there were things 'back home' we needed to attend to. We had planned to go to Shell (the jungle) for five days, and friends from Wisconsin were coming to visit us in early September. (Little did we know that the Lord also had other things planned!)

#### TRIP TO THE JUNGLE'S EDGE - SHELL



As some of you know, Shell (formerly Shell Mera) was the radio base for the five missionaries - Jim Elliot, Nate Saint, and others - who set out to reach the nomadic, spearing, Waorani tribe. In Shell's village park, there is a replica of Nate Saint's 'little yellow piper' plane. ← Sondra Sitting on the Letter 'L" of the Word 'SHELL'.

Miriam, a Reach Beyond missionary nurse, has worked with the Waorani for years. Having become friends with her, she invited us to stay with her for five days to get away from the city. This was arranged before we made our first trip to the U.S. Enjoying Home-Made Hawaiian Pizza Made by a Venezuelan Street Vendor Whom We Got to Know During Our 4-Day Stay. →







Miriam not only works with the tribal people in the jungle but also refers them to the local 'Christian Mission Foundation of Health' in Shell (formerly 'Hospital Voz Andes-Oriente' of Reach Beyond). This day-clinic and day-hospital, now directed and operated by Dr. Wolff, a former doctor with our mission, helps to provide services for the tribal people of the jungle and the ← local people in the village.

During our stay, Miriam told us about a patient she was taking to an appointment at the day clinic – a Waorani tribal woman who had walked six hours out of the jungle, then rode nine hours in a pick-up truck to be seen at the clinic.

Miriam explained to us that this woman is a widow. Her husband was speared to death while trying to share the Gospel with fellow unreached Waorani tribal members. Miriam mentioned that this lady brought some hand-woven baskets with her that she was hoping to sell. So, we decided to purchase the three most expensive baskets knowing that the money would help her with her clinic bills.

We later walked to the clinic to give the money to Miriam. Because Miriam still was busy assisting the patient, we were able to meet the patient as well as her daughter. When the woman found out that we had purchased her baskets she began speaking to me in Wao (their tribal language). As she spoke, her daughter Guacaamo interpreted the conversation into Spanish (which was all I needed) but then Miriam interpreted it further into English because Darrell was recording everything on video. > https://youtu.be/2 EQn TYxrk



I continued talking with her daughter, Guacaamo, sharing my thoughts about what happened that day in the jungle when the five missionaries were killed. I had hoped to encourage her because her father lost his life to the end of the spear just as the missionaries did. Instead, she shared with me her own great story of faith, explaining that her husband is Gilberto Nenguimo, grandson of Mincaye (one of the six killers who speared the missionaries)!

#### A WISCONSIN-VENEZUELA CONNECTION

While in Wisconsin this summer, the Erickson Family, from Woodlands Church, approached us about a young man they know who was trying to escape Venezuela and the current crisis there. They had known him from several short-term mission trips to a children's home in which he had lived. Godson, who had been neglected by his mentally-ill mother, was found to have been living on the streets from four until five years old. The authorities then placed him in 'Ninos de La Luz' where he spent the next 13 years of his life. This Wisconsin family has kept in touch with him and was concerned about his well-being, hoping he could find a way to leave Venezuela.

A series of conversations led to the decision that we could assist them with the details in getting him safely from Venezuela to Ecuador. If he could complete the journey, we agreed to meet him at the Carcelen bus terminal and then take him to Pan de Vida. But Godson arrived one day earlier, on a Sunday, when Pan de Vida was not open. So, with God's help, we took Godson into our home. As we came to know him better, we decided he would stay with us for the next two weeks. We then worked to connect him with various resources (a social worker at Pan de Vida, the Venezuelan pastor of our church district, our Ecuadorian pastor and his wife, other Venezuelans in our church, and two other bi-cultural couples) who all would look after him until we returned from our future travels.

# ZIMBAUER'S VISIT TO QUITO AND SURROUNDING AREAS



One would think that we already had plenty of relaxation time. But, traveling around Ecuador many days from sunrise until late night took the wind out of our sails. During our time with our friends, we had to remind ourselves that the reason we were more tired than they were - was because we are almost 20 years older!! So, after spending one night in Point, one of our new supporters provided us with a 5-day stay in their cabin in northern Wisconsin! We were situated on a quiet 'no-wake' lake (no boat motors allowed). There was no internet, no phone signal (except at times at the end of the pier), nor any neighbors across the other side of the lake! - Also, no noisy buses, no traffic, no pollution, and no schedule! We felt like we were in heaven! And the added blessings - our hosts had provided us with BBQ ribs, home-made pumpkin pie with whipped cream, wine, and various other delicacies that we typically can't find in Ecuador. We spent our days barbequing, eating, reading, walking, sitting on the pier, taking pontoon boat rides, taking photos of God's creation, spending time with each other, and getting to know the friendly next-door neighbors who had brought us home-made cookies and invited us for dessert, wine, and a chat at their home. It's amazing how hospitable folks are!

### TRAVELING TO CHURCHES

During three Sundays, we engaged in various types of church presentations or visits. Each of our three wonderful 'supporting churches' care for us in their own unique way. At one, we were offered a table in the foyer and were prayed for during the service, at the other, a 10-minute presentation during the service, and at another, a 1-hour presentation with an accompanying lunch. At each church, the time spent there brought forth much fruit: over \$500 in sales of items that will bless others in Ecuador, people who took 'prayer photos' home with them reminding them to pray for a particular student in the Extreme Response Zambiza After-School Program, others who signed up to receive our newsletters for the first time, others who signed up to be Special Prayer Partners, an entire congregation who received a brochure about our upcoming service project in 2021, and many folks who asked lots of questions!

One particular blessing is someone from Community Church who is our new 'rope-holder' (or advocate). Her name is Tianna. She is a lively, bouncy, young, soon-to-be-mother, who meets with us when we are in the U.S. and video Skypes with us every other month when we are in Ecuador. She listens to us, encourages us, prays with us, and presents our ministry and prayer requests to her church congregation every few months during the church service. We pray that every missionary would be blessed to be able to have a 'Tianna' of their own!



We first became aware of Melba when she sent her Samaritan Ministries financial share to us for our recent medical need. Members send a card and/or note of encouragement along with their monthly share. Melba's was unique in that it was in Spanish. Tina Bush, our stateside assistant who manages our mail and accounts, scanned Melba's card then sent a message to us asking, "I wonder how Melba knows that you speak Spanish?". She could <u>not</u> have known, but we concluded, by her last name, that perhaps she did not know English well. I then wrote her back, in Spanish, asking Tina to print out my return letter and mail it to Melba.



Well - during our stay in Wisconsin, a woman we know from Woodlands Church (Julie) was making baby bibs for us to take back to Pan de Vida for the new Venezuelan mothers. The mother-in-law of Julie's brother then asked where Julie was sending the bibs. When Julie said "with missionaries in Ecuador named Holden", the mother-in-law of Julie's brother (Melba!) exclaimed, "I received a letter from these missionaries written in Spanish!"

← Melba (in striped sweater in photo) was visiting Julie's family during our visit! So, they all came to our church presentation and later invited us to their home for a traditional, home-cooked Latino meal. They are planning a family trip to Colombia soon, and hope to visit us in Ecuador sometime in the future. How incredibly small God's world really is!

### 'AT HOME' ON THE RIVER



Our next 'home' was in a house on the river in Wisconsin Rapids. This family invited us to stay in their spacious home during the next 2 ½ weeks. They inherited this beautiful house and land, later realizing that the Lord wanted them to bless others with it. - We truly were!





This place provided us with a beautiful, spacious, and tranquil atmosphere in which to prepare our minds and our souls for our return to Ecuador.

We sometimes wonder why the Lord is so good to us. We know He loves us and wants to show His love by providing and caring for us. What we didn't know, was that these tranquil and restful places were provided specifically for us, at this particular time, because He knew that we'd need to be well-rested before returning back to our country of service where recent violent civil unrest had been taking place for 12 days. Our return to Ecuador was now postponed (by our mission) for 8 days! IN THE END, WE MOVED IN WITH THE ERICKSON FAMILY IN WILD ROSE, WI.

Authorities say this is the worst civil unrest Ecuador has seen in 60+ years. Although things seem to be more peaceful at present, the U.S. Embassy's advice is to keep diligent watch and to stock up on supplies for possible future outbreaks. - Please continue praying for everyone's safety, here, in Ecuador.
